OBITUARY: SUSAN PHILLIPS 12/4/40 - 9/9/22

It is with much sadness that we report the passing of Susan Phillips who lost her battle with cancer in September.

Susan had a lifelong passion for music and after leaving the Northern School of Music qualified as a teacher and began teaching at Fulwood High School in 1972. In that role she produced many musicals and enabled pupils to professionally record a disc. At the same time she served as an organist, pianist and choir master at churches in Euxton, Ribbleton and St Martins and St Peter's churches in Fulwood. Susan also taught privately and the numbers of pupils both young and older who benefitted from her skills, enthusiasm and patience are too many to list. Her love of singing meant that she was involved with many choirs both as a singer or musical director. Choirs that benefited from her skills included St Nicholas singers, Preston Orpheus, St Leonard's G&S society, Occasions, Barton WI choir, Lifelong Singers, Harmony Singers and latterly Singing 4 You in Bamber Bridge, where she continued to participate until July this year. She produced two memorable "Last Night of the Proms" in Fulwood and conducted both the choir and a joint piece with the brass band. Susan remained abreast of modern musical trends and could tailor performances to both current fashion and her target audience. Any performances that Susan was involved with raised very significant sums for local charities including Rosemere, St Catherine's Hospice and McMillan cancer support.

The fruits of her works will be seen for many years to come and it is with great fondness that we now sing her "theme tune" - " As long as I have music" . **Singing 4 You**

A warm welcome to Preston U3A which has now joined Preston Arts Association.



PRESTON SCHOOLGIRL HAS FILM PREMIERED IN TIMES SQUARE

Millie Hine, a 17-year old student at Cardinal Newman College has had her latest film selected in the All American High School Film Festival. On Saturday October 22nd, she saw her film premier in Times Square, New York. The following is an edited version of an interview I had with her on October 27th. VS: I don't want this to be a carbon copy of Blog Preston's interview, so can I start with the bits they couldn't do because they hadn't happened yet? You're just back from New York where the film was premiered, and I bet you still haven't come down to earth.

MH: Absolutely. I had one of the actresses with me and we had to keep reminding ourselves that this was really happening, and step back and take a deep breath.

VS: Did they fly you out, where did you stay, and did you get a chance to see anything on Broadway.

MH: We paid to fly out and we stayed in the Midtown Hilton not far from Times Square. Most of our time was spent at the festival, but we also managed to see Harry Potter and the Cursed Child on Broadway?

VS: One of the photos you sent me was taken inside the cinema and it showed a near full house. Were you able to assess the audience reaction?

MH: That photo was at the awards ceremony. Our audience wasn't quite as big but we got a good crowd and a round of applause as the The End appeared on screen and another after the credits had rolled. Some said it stood out from the bunch of films it was with, particularly for its story. The next day we had the red-carpet event. It was lovely to talk to likeminded people and independent film makers. Those with more experience said how great it was to get recognition at my age and they gave us lots of encouragement.

VS: I noticed in your earlier interview you talked about adapting your storyline according to what felt right on the day. Did you make many changes that way or were you able to stick largely to the original script?

MH: We had upwards of 20 drafts but sometimes the one we were using didn't sound right on the day. I'd say to the actresses "What do you think?". Other times we sat round the kitchen table and worked it out together over a few hot chocolates. It's as much their film as mine.

VS: I was intrigued when you said your A-level subjects had nothing to do with film and this helped. We're often taught that to do something well we have to study how the masters did it. But this clearly hasn't been the case with you. You're an instinctive film maker.

MH: Thank you for saying that. I think it was Tarantino who said that there'll always be someone who knows how to use a camera, but there won't always be someone who knows how to tell your story. The successful ones are often those who manage to do something a bit different. I think studying other subjects gives you a unique approach that allows you to tell those different stories.

VS: The storyline seems to be about the "problems" young people have as they pass through adolescence. They can be difficult. Parents and family don't understand, and they sometimes respond badly. Holly is convinced she has inherited her mother's "evil" nature. Grace, in trying to persuade Holly she's not evil admits (if I heard this correctly) that she too can be "a pain in the arse sometimes".

MH: Yes, she does say that.

VS: And you're moving back and forth between the present, where Holly and Grace are friends, and a fairy tale past where the same two characters act out Holly's medieval allegory of the same situation. Have I got that about right?

MH: Absolutely spot on.

VS: There seem to be lots of instances where the allegorical nature of the story can be interpreted in different ways. For instance, the title. The Snake and the Apple, has biblical connotations - good people being tempted into wrongdoing. It seems at one point that perhaps Grace is being "taken over" by the snake which uses her to voice its evil. This happens when she tempts Holly to take the apple. But in a departure from the biblical version, it's Grace who snatches the apple and laughs uproariously. That could have more than one interpretation? Is it

MH: Yes, with it being a short film (16 minutes), we couldn't always say everything, but we also wanted to leave a bit of a hanging feeling, to leave some questions unanswered — a bit like a poem that tells you just enough. Regarding biblical aspects, we all have faults and it's those which make us what we are. We see ourselves at times as bad people and we have to learn to accept that we're not perfect. We're human and set a bar that's impossible to meet. Grace is there to remind us of that.

VS: Besides the story and the acting, I was very impressed with just about every other aspect of the film – the direction, editing, photography, music. The music brilliantly compliments what's happening on the screen.

MH: Thank you very much. It was many weeks of experimenting and editing, and I will always be grateful for such talented, dedicated actresses.

VS: I also noticed how closely you were involved with all aspects of film making, being credited as Writer, Director, Editor, and jointly for cinematography and costume design. You enjoy the whole process or are you a control freak? And how did you find the time with A Levels coming up?

MH: To be honest I ended up doing nearly everything, but it was practicality rather than being a control freak. With a few hiccups along the way, I needed to co-ordinate and keep everything moving smoothly. I found the time through very long days. I got in college very early and was often there all day, up at half 6 and working till 8, then working on the film till 12 and up again at half 6. But it was definitely worth it.

VS: Finally, congratulations again, thank you for talking to me and good luck with whatever comes next.

MH: Thank you. I look forward to seeing the film in the Preston Arts Festival and having the Q&A session!
